The Founding of SALT

A History

Norman Dorsen, Michael Rooke-Ley and Joyce Saltalamachia

In December 1972, Aryeh Neier, then executive director of the ACLU, convened a group of law professors at the ACLU office in New York City. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the need for an association of progressive law teachers to address perceived problems with legal education as well as larger societal issues. Several converging events prompted this meeting: the Nixon era, the newly conservative Supreme Court, the slowing of the national commitment to civil rights and the growing awareness of the arbitrary nature of law school admissions as well as state bar examinations. It was thought that an association of law school professors could provide an organizational base to address these and other pressing issues.

In 1973, Professor Norman Dorsen, who had attended the first meeting, was asked to convene a second meeting, adding additional invitees to the original group. At this and subsequent meetings, the group formulated goals and activities for the new association. These included:

- 1. Providing a means for law professors to assist in drafting progressive legislation.
- 2. Encouraging legal education to be more responsive to social needs.
- 3. Preparing studies, reports, and legislative recommendations on matters of public and professional concern.
- 4. Evaluating federal judicial appointments.
- 5. Encouraging greater diversity on law faculties and within student bodies.
- 6. Combating violations of academic freedom.
- Monitoring instances of racism and arbitrariness on bar examinations and elsewhere.

The professors who attended these early meetings included highly respected members of the legal education academy: Frank Askin (Rutgers), Derrick Bell (Harvard), Ralph S. Brown (Yale), David

Chambers (Michigan), Thomas I. Emerson (Yale), Ruth Ginsburg (Columbia), Howard Lesnick (Pennsylvania), and Herman Schwartz (SUNY Buffalo). After long discussion they concluded that an association of law professors was not only desirable but feasible.

In early 1973, Norman Dorsen sent a formal proposal for a law professor association to 35 other law professors, which included a questionnaire on the concept of the new association as well as its tentative goals and activities. This proposal made clear that the new organization would not conflict with the AALS, which had recently renewed its intention to remain an association of law schools, not of law teachers. The response to the Dorsen proposal was overwhelmingly positive.

The December 1973 AALS meeting in New Orleans was thought to be the ideal place to launch the new association. Armed with signs and notices, Dorsen and Stephen Gillers, one of his former students and now a law professor at NYU, gathered a group of some 60 law professors, which voted enthusiastically to found the new body. Originally, the name "National Association of Law Professors" was used. Several who attended, in particular David Cavers of Harvard, suggested the term "Society" be used to suggest a more scholarly body. They also thought that the name should include "American". Discussion continued and the term "Teachers" instead of "Professors" was proposed to indicate the broader nature of the group. The group then formally adopted the name "Society of American Law Teachers", and the organization was officially launched. Norman Dorsen was elected SALT's first president, and Stephen Gillers its first Executive Director. Anthony Amsterdam, Derrick Bell, Ralph Brown, and Tom Emerson were named Vice Presidents. Thus, in December 1973, SALT was founded.

Over the next few months, a 31-member interim Board of Governors worked to draft proposed by-laws. In keeping with its democratic aspirations, the new organization set dues at \$25 per year, with a level of \$15 for those making less than \$15,000 a year. By September 1974, 149 law teachers from 69 law schools had joined SALT. At that point, Dorsen wrote a recruitment letter inviting all American law teachers to join. It was also in 1974 that the articles of incorporation were filed for the new society. The original structure of a president, four vice-presidents, a treasurer, a secretary and a Board of Governors.

The thirtieth anniversary of SALT was celebrated at the annual SALT banquet held during the AALS convention, fittingly in New Orleans, on January 5, 2002, at which the organization's founders were honored.

2013 SALT Highlights

SALT had another busy and eventful year as we continued to work on issues central to our core mission: diversity, justice, and academic excellence. We want to thank all the Board members, SALT members, and institutions who contributed their time, energy and resources to SALT's efforts. SALT is a member-supported, all volunteer organization. None of this work would be possible without your passion and dedication.

- The 25th Annual Robert Cover Workshop on "The Academy's Role in the Access to Justice Crisis"
- SALT honored Norris Henderson and Professor Margaret Montoya during its **Annual Dinner** in New Orleans.
- SALT continued its engagement with issues in legal education. We attended and participated in ABA Standards and Review Committee (SRC) and ABA Council meetings throughout the year. We submitted letters on proposed changes to the standards related to tenure, affirmative action, bar passage, school finances, and pro bono requirements. We invited our members to engage in a discussion on the cost of legal education and we will address this issue directly in the SALT Consumer Guide (forthcoming 2014).
- SALT, in collaboration with Columbia Law School Sexuality and Gender Law Clinic, issued a policy paper Strategies for LGBT Students, Faculty and Staff Facing Discrimination at Religiously Affiliated Law Schools. The National Gay and Lesbian Bar Association invited SALT to discuss the paper at its annual conference.
- SALT sponsored four B.A. to J.D. Pipeline programs at American
 University Washington College of Law, Santa Clara Law School,
 University of Houston Law Center and the University of Puerto Rico
 Law School. We want to thank these schools and their dedicated
 faculty and staff for their support and efforts on SALT's behalf.
- SALT was invited to speak about the importance of diversity in law schools and the legal profession at the Pacific Coast Pre-Law Advisor Association, Southwest Pre-Law Advisors Association and the ABA Annual Meeting.
- SALT, with pro bono counsel at Crowell & Moring, filed an **amicus brief** in *Schuette v. Coalition to Defend Affirmative Action*.
- SALT joined **amicus briefs**, in *United States v. Windsor and Hollingsworth v. Perry.*

- The Norman Amaker, Trino Grillo, Robert Cover and People's Law Conference social justice retreats provided a unique opportunity for public interest and social justice-oriented law students, faculty, and practitioners to exchange viewpoints, explore career opportunities, and formulate strategies for social justice.
- SALT co-sponsored: "Criminal Justice in the 21st Century: The Challenge to Protect Individual Freedoms, Civil Rights and Our Safety."
- SALT co-sponsored the Eleventh Annual SALT-LatCrit Junior
 Faculty Development Workshop where we announced the SALT
 Junior Faculty Teaching Award will be presented for the first time
 at the SALT Teaching Conference in October 2014.
- SALT, with Seattle University Law School and the host University of Washington School of Law, sponsored the Diversity in Law School Leadership Conference.
- SALT sponsored a "Breaking-In" Panel How to Become a Law Professor or Administrator at the Southeast/Southwest People of Color Conference.
- SALT joined a letter written by the Santa Clara Law Human Rights Clinic protesting the treatment of LGBT individuals in Jamaica.
- SALT applied for **UN "consultative status"** as a non-governmental organization (NGO). Northeastern law students Alicia Tambe '14 and Aradhana Tiwari '14 worked to research and prepare the application under the supervision of Hope Lewis and Beth Lyon. The application was submitted in the Spring and SALT is awaiting the UN's approval or request for further information.
- SALT's Human Rights Committee is participating in USHRN's 2013-2014 shadow reporting effort by submitting comments on U.S. compliance with the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (ICERD) as it implicates legal education, law teaching, affirmative action, pipeline issues, and the like.
- SALT issued its Annual Salary Survey.
- The SALT Blog continues to thrive with law professors writing on significant issues of the day, from the use of drones to marriage equality, from the cost of legal education to the significance of diversity in the classroom.
- SALT redesigned and updated SALTLAW.ORG with greater capacity, security, and a new look, with planned expansion over the next year.



Philadelphia: Full Time Practice, Part-Time Teaching

Holly Maguigan was, and is, my role model, my favorite law professor, a fabulous teacher, an outstanding lawyer, and also for many years, a dear friend! As a law student at Rutgers Camden School of Law back in the late 1970's, I learned of the amazing work being done by the progressive Philadelphia law firm of Kairys, Rudovsky & Maguigan, which was local counsel for the National Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (long since merged with the Center for Constitutional Rights), and an integral base for the local National Lawyers Guild. I resurrected a long dormant NECLC clinical internship, providing the opportunity to learn from the best, the most exciting, the incomparable Holly Maguigan!

While David Rudovsky and David Kairys weren't bad to learn from either, as a young feminist law student, I sought guidance and inspiration, a role model if you will, and Holly provided this to me and without doubt, to many, many others! From the excellent trial advocacy class that Holly taught at Rutgers to the semester long clinical experience with Holly and KRM, I had a breadth of

opportunities to learn trial skills, as well as the practical necessities of trial preparation. Investigation! Thoughtful consideration of motivation. WHAT happened and why? And of course, treating clients with care and abiding respect. Holly was innovative. I observed and provided law student assistance in awe in a case involving the very early use of a battered woman's assertion of self-defense: A defense not exactly welcomed by the courts in those days.

Holly did criminal defense work with passion and pizazz. From Holly I learned about indefatigable commitment in the practice of law. I observed joy and struggles in the practice of law in conformity with one's principles.

Holly is an amazing teacher. I learned so much in her trial advocacy course. She was supportive, but always challenged her students. I was intimidated, but got over it. I certainly grew from Holly's excellent tutelage.

By working so closely with Holly, I came to a frightening awareness that if I followed her lead, my legal future was likely to be exhausting, frenetic, not necessarily overwhelming, but requiring dedication that I wasn't too sure I was up to. Yet admiring Holly's tenacity and example, I thought well, maybe.... I can. Thanks in major part to choosing Holly as my role model, I have spent the past 34 years practicing law in Philly, New Jersey, and Hawaii as a NLG member, doing progressive legal work in the public interest. Whether in private practice or as a legal services attorney for more than two decades serving low income individuals, I have always been committed to serving communities in need in addition to my legal work.

Holly, whom I admired so much, lives this ethic, and so, I was encouraged to emulate that enthusiasm and skill, challenging myself - for the benefit of my clients and myself. I learned this and more from Holly. Let's not forget the importance of humor and grace.

The Early Clinic Years at NYU

When I tell people I would not have survived my third year of law school without taking Clinic, they think I am talking about the benefits of clinical education. When I decided to go back to school, she wrote me a recommendation, and when I entered the academy, she introduced me to SALT so I would have a community of progressive peers. Holly has been a mentor, colleague and friend to me and so many other students she has touched, and I happy to see this acknowledged by her receiving the 2014 Great Teacher Award from SALT. — Malik C Edwards

NYU - II


There were very few reasons for Holly to be optimistic about my prospects when I showed up in her Criminal Defense Clinic in the fall of 1999. The only lawyers I'd known before arriving at NYU were on *L.A. Law*, and even though I was a third-year student, I displayed a shocking lack of familiarity with the Rules of Evidence. In our first trial simulation, I frequently asked questions that both called for hearsay and asked about prior bad acts—in the very same question. But still, Holly encouraged me. She taught me to listen to, respect, and represent my clients the way I would want my brother or my child to be treated, and she assured me that the rest would just follow. She was right. After I graduated from NYU, my career went in a million different directions; I have been a law clerk, a public defender, an employment lawyer, a parents' attorney

in child welfare cases, and an editor, but Holly's teaching has always served me well. At one point, my husband received a fellowship to work in India. Not only did Holly make connections for me at a wonderful law school in the relatively obscure Indian city where we lived, she and her husband, Abdeen, were the only people who visited us who were not members of our immediate families. There are many things that make Holly Maguigan a great teacher. Her compassion. Her intellect. Her wit. But it is her willingness to treat students, clients, and colleagues like family that makes her an extraordinary one. — *Michele Host*

NYU - III

Holly Maguigan has been my mentor and friend this past decade. I came to NYU law as a fellowship -funded international student from India. Holly taught me Evidence, Comparative Criminal Justice and Global Public Service Law. I followed her around as much as I could and, looking back, law school education was about what she taught me so that was a good idea! Developing a self-defense argument for a client in a homicide case and reading Holly's articles on self-defense at the same time gave legal education a new meaning.

I practiced law in India and wanted to be a law teacher myself. Now I work as a Lecturer at University of Bristol, Law School (UK) and teach Constitutional Law, but back in 2003 this was only a dream. Until I met Holly I did not realize how much I needed a role model. In India my university (right at the top of law school rankings in India) had just two women in the faculty, neither of whom taught core law subjects. It was far from ideal for a woman starting out in law. Seeing Holly integrating court cases and clients with teaching and truly caring about each student while engaging in research and writing ensured that I wanted to do that myself. I try hard now, but Holly knew an entire class of 150 students by name and could recognize them outside the classroom in the first couple of weeks of teaching. She even knew who preferred to be called what (e.g. Joe or Joseph) and who had which career aspiration. The standards she has set will keep me very busy for the rest of my life. — *Devyani Prabhat*



Florence Roisman is a legendary civil and human rights advocate, an accomplished teacher and a very dear mentor to hundreds of lawyers. Florence is a model social justice law professor whose life stands as an inspiration for every one of us. Her passion for justice has come alive through decades of leadership in significant impact litigation, legislative and administrative advocacy, academic teaching and writing, and endless personal interactions with law students, professors, practicing lawyers. The substantive focus of her practice, teaching, and writing has been on lowincome housing, homelessness, and housing discrimination and segregation.

Florence is the William F. Harvey Professor of Law at Indiana University Robert H. McKinney School of Law. She received her B.A. at the University of Connecticut with High Honors, Distinction in English and in History, and Phi Beta Kappa in 1959. She graduated LL.B. cum laude from Harvard Law School in 1963.

Florence Wagman Roisman began practice at the Federal Trade Commission in 1963. In 1964, she joined the U.S. Department of Justice in the appellate section of the Civil Division.

In 1967, she became staff attorney, and later managing attorney, for the D.C. Neighborhood Legal Services Program (NLSP), initiating a 30-year association with the federally financed program of civil legal assistance to poor people. While at NLSP, she was co-counsel in several of the major landlord-tenant cases that now appear in many property casebooks. Subsequent to her tenure with NLSP, she worked with the legal services program both in private practice and through the National Housing Law Project.

For several decades Florence Roisman served as the nation's leading

litigator and advocate for renters of public and private housing. She sued for due process for renters, against racial segregation in housing, for implied warranty of habitability, against retaliatory evictions, for free transcripts for indigent parties, with tenants in rent strikes, against demolition of public housing unless there was replacement housing, for Section 8 tenants, for the homeless, against gentrification, for better lease and grievance processes and numerous other claims for residents of public housing. For example, she was counsel in a successful 1990 nation-wide federal class action on behalf of public housing tenants establishing their right to due process notice and hearing before eviction. On behalf of renters and low income housing residents, Florence has sued the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Department of Agriculture, the former Cabinet level department Health, Education and Welfare, the District of Columbia, numerous Cabinet members, Governors, local housing authorities, elected officials, private and public landlords as well as mortgage holders.

In 1989, she was the first recipient of the Kutak-Dodds Prize, awarded by the ABA's Standing Committee on Legal Aid and Indigent Defendants and the National Legal Aid and Defender Association. In 1994 she was the first recipient of the Georgetown University Law Center Equal Justice Foundation Award for Outstanding Faculty Commitment to Public Interest Law. In 2000, she received the Thurgood Marshall Award given by the District of Columbia Bar. Prof. Roisman received the inaugural Equal Justice Works Outstanding Law School Faculty Award in 2004 "for her dogged pursuit of equal justice and her pivotal role in nurturing a public interest ethic among law students." In 2010, the District of Columbia Legal Aid Society gave her its Servant of Justice Award "for faithful dedication and remarkable

achievement in assuring that all persons have equal and meaningful access to justice." In 2011, she received from the National Law Income Housing Coalition the Cushing Niles Dolbeare Lifetime Service Award.

She has taught full-time at Georgetown University Law Center and the law schools of the University of Maryland, Catholic University, and Widener University; she has taught part-time at the George Washington University National Law Center and the Antioch School of Law. In 2006 she was the J. Skelly Wright Fellow at Yale Law School. In 2002 and 2011, she received Trustees' Teaching Awards from Indiana University. Professor Roisman serves on the boards of the American Civil Liberties Union of Indiana and the Inclusive Communities Project of Dallas, TX. She previously served on the boards of the Society of American Law Teachers, the National ACLU, the District of Columbia Bar, the Washington Legal Clinic for the Homeless, and the Poverty and Race Research Action Council, of which she was a co-founder.

Professor Roisman has written dozens of law review articles addressing racial segregation in housing, economic justice for low income people, homelessness, civil and human rights.

Many of us know Florence Roisman as mentor, guide and friend. She has never been too busy to take a call, listen to a question, give some advice, connect us to each other, show us how to do something, point us in the right direction, or let us stay at her home. Thank you Florence for a lifetime showing us what justice and love in action can look like.

The euro-centric nature of the andro-anthro-centric system means that women of color, particularly women from outside of Europe and North America, will suffer the gravest consequences of the violence.

In the middle of the second sentence, Ellen dropped a footnote that said: "If patriarchy were natural, it would not require such an awkward sentence to describe it."
